Deacon's Corner

The Feast of the Nativity of the Blessed Virgin Mary will be celebrated on Friday, September 8, nine months after the Immaculate Conception on December 8. This feast of Mary's birth has been celebrated in the Holy Church since the sixth century. Little is known about the birth or the upbringing of Mary since Holy Scripture first introduces Mary at the Annunciation when the angel Gabriel announces that she was to become the Mother of the Son of God.

However, the Protoevangelium of James, a second century document, explains that Saints Anna and Joachim, Mary's parents, are infertile, but pray for a child. They receive a promise of a child who will aid God's plan for salvation in the world. This child is our Blessed Mother. Mary's parents raise her to love and serve Our Lord.

Saint Augustine tells us that Mary's birth is linked with Jesus' work of salvation. He says the world should rejoice about her birth for "she is the flower of the field from whom bloomed the precious lily of the valley. Through her birth, the nature inherited from our first parents is changed."

On her birthday, may we pray, "Dearest Mother Mary, please pray for us, that we will more fully imitate your many virtues, so that we may be true disciples of your divine Son, Jesus Christ. Mother Mary, pray for us."
