Deacon's Lorner

We celebrate the memorial of St. Pope Gregory the Great, Pope and Doctor of the Church, on Friday, September 3. Born in Rome in 520, St. Gregory came from a wealthy family. He was well educated in the law and became the Prefect of Rome. Soon, Gregory left this life and became a monk. After his father's death, he donated one of his family estates and founded six monasteries on this land. In his writings, he explained that he desired to live the monastic life which brought him great joy. Her referred to himself "as a servant of God." However, in 590, Gregory was proclaimed pope by acclamation, something he did not seek nor desire. As pope, St. Gregory reformed the Church. He made changes to the Mass, some that remain today. One example is the placement of the Our Father prayer in the Mass. Under Pope Gregory, the number of deacons in the Church increased and they served in the parishes. St. Gregory was known for his generosity to the poor. When a famine occurred in Rome, he ordered the Church, which owned a large acreage of land, to donate the produce of these farms to the people. He died in 604. He is the patron saint of musicians, singer, students and teachers.

The life of St. Gregory the Great shows each of us that the path of life that God chooses for us does not always follow the way we believe it should unfold. St. Gregory accepted God's decision for his life. His life was a true gift for the people of the Church as he accepted God's will. Like St. Gregory, are we willing to accept the path of life that God chooses for us to become the people we are meant to be?
